## message from our Board Chair and CEO

As we look back on 2024, we're proud of how we kept our mission moving forward through partnership, community support, and persistence.

One of our most meaningful accomplishments was continuing the Onondaga project with Habitat Hamilton and Six Nations of the Grand River. This partnership helped more families access the safety and stability that comes with affordable housing. It's a powerful reminder of what's possible when we work together to meet a shared need and strengthen communities from the ground up.

At Habitat, the work doesn't begin or end with a construction project. Our mission is powered by people – those who give, volunteer, donate goods, and partner with us to create lasting change. In 2024, that spirit was visible across our entire region: in our ReStores, where thousands of volunteer hours supported local efforts and environmental sustainability; in the generous support from donors and sponsors; and in the relationships we've continued to build across all six counties we serve. The housing crisis remains one of the most urgent and complex issues facing our communities. Families are working hard, but too many still don't have access to safe, stable housing. Our role is to stay focused – planning, listening, and preparing to act when the opportunity to build presents itself. We must also continue advocating for policies and partnerships that support affordable homeownership in the long term.

This year reminded us that progress takes many forms. Even when shovels aren't in the ground, meaningful work is happening every day – through outreach, education, volunteer engagement, and long-term planning. That momentum is only possible because people like you continue to believe in what we do.

Thank you for your ongoing support. We're proud of what we've done together – and ready for what's ahead.

Honouring a life of service | Jimmy Carter 1924-2024

In 2024, the Habitat for Humanity family around the world mourned the loss of former U.S. President Jimmy Carter—a man whose deep compassion and lifelong commitment to service transformed the way we think about housing, dignity, and community.

With his wife Rosalynn, President Carter spent decades building alongside Habitat volunteers and future homeowners. Their hands-on dedication brought global attention to the need for affordable housing and the power of helping others help themselves.

In Canada, we were honoured to welcome the Carters for several builds, including their final visit during Canada's 150th anniversary of confederation. In 2017, they joined volunteers in Edmonton and Winnipeg and those who participated still speak of the humility and drive shown by the couple.

President Carter's impact lives on in the homes built, lives changed, and people inspired. At Habitat Heartland Ontario, we honour that legacy every time we build together.

Thank you, President and Mrs. Carter, for showing us what service truly means.

Habitat ReStores are home improvement outlets that accept and sell donated furniture, appliances, and building materials to the public.

Every item donated or sold helps support Habitat's mission while giving usable goods a second life.

## Onondaga project



In 2024, Habitat for Humanity Heartland Ontario, in partnership with Habitat Hamilton and Six Nations of the Grand River Housing, proudly completed Phase 2 of the Onondaga project. This phase doubled our contribution by adding a second, five-unit townhome complex on Six Nations territory, bringing the total number of new homes to ten.



To mark this milestone, we hosted a key ceremony attended by new homeowners, community members, dignitaries, media, and representatives from Six Nations and Onondaga. It was a moment of pride, partnership, and celebration.

This project continues to demonstrate the impact of collaboration in addressing the urgent need for safe, affordable housing. Like many communities we serve, Six Nations faces a significant housing shortage. The Onondaga project reflects our shared commitment to building strong, healthy futures through meaningful partnerships and community-led solutions.



## our volunteer community

Volunteers play a central role in our mission at Habitat for Humanity Heartland Ontario. From ReStores and build sites to salvage crews, their time and effort help power every part of our work.

In 2024, more than 846 volunteers gave thousands of hours to support our efforts across the region. We're especially grateful to our top contributors, whose commitment continues to make a lasting difference.

Team Days offer corporate groups a hands-on way to give back while supporting Habitat's work. Whether on a build site or in one of our ReStores, these volunteer experiences help businesses make a tangible impact while fostering team connection and community involvement.

In 2024, 137 volunteers joined us through Team Days, contributing more than 615 hours across our sites. Most Build Team Days took place at the Onondaga Phase 2 site, where groups helped move the project closer to completion. ReStore Team Days continued across our region, offering vital support for store operations and customer service. Together, these efforts raised over \$25,000 to support affordable housing.
